Back in the day he played for Lahden Reipas, one half of Lahti's great footballing rivalry. His club was founded in Vyborg and, like Ilves Kissat in Tampere, moved wholesale to lahti when the peace treaty necessitated the evacuation of karelia.

The other club, FC Kuusysi, beat Zenit St Petersburg and FC Sarajevo in the 1986 European Cup before going out in the Quarter Finals to the eventual winners Steaua Bucharest. Kuusysi and Reipas merged to become FC Lahti, which gets smaller crowds than either club got before the merger.

As always in these situations, the junior clubs kept their identity and are the ones that coach the youth of Lahti. This gives them a 'presence' in thousands of Lahti families that FC Lahti cannot hope to achieve, and means that if they ever managed to resurrect themselves they'd have a ready-made fan base. At present Kuusysi's juniors set up a new club called 'city stars' so that they didn't have to stop playing at 18, and they are now in the third tier. Reipas have no senior side.

Just been watching a BBC2 Storyville documentary about Barcelona's 03/04 season (their first under a new boardroom regime). There's a scene where Barca's finance director, Ferran Soriano, is talking in English to somebody on the phone while driving along a motorway. It turns out that Patrick Kluivert's representatives asked for €3 million while renegotiating his contract in 2000. The club gave them €1.5 million and sort of half-promised them another €500,000 further down the line, but that half million euro has obviously become a source of some rancour.

Later, Soriano and Aitor "Txiki" Beguiristain are having a meeting about the playing-staff budget for the upcoming 04/05 season. Soriano says: "Last year we had €54 million in fixed salaries, €13 million in bonuses. This year it's €56 million fixed, €20 million in bonuses."

Beguiristain says: "Not counting the big news that could happen? We could save a lot of dough there."

Soriano: "If Patrick goes, we save 10%. He's 10% of the total."

Beguiristain: "The squad will be cheaper next year."

Soriano: "That's very difficult. We've brought in expensive new players. It'd be cheaper if Patrick and Rustu went."

Beguiristain: "Four players eat up €13 million of the fixed salaries."

Kluivert left the club for Newcastle United that summer.

The documentary also includes a clip of him heading in a close-range equaliser against Real Madrid at the Bernabeu, so he did score at least one important goal for Barcelona.

It's not uncommon for a deeply average player to find himself in a good team and be lauded merely through his association with the success of those around him, those who are basically carrying him.

I can draw something of an analogy with someone we have been talking about a lot recently, Dirk Kuyt. Now of course I'm not comparing current Liverpool with 90s Ajax, however because Liverpool are doing ok at the moment, I have noticed that Kuyt has started to get some positive write ups in newspapers and on here despite remaining pretty much as awful as he has been all season and playing a sort of horrible emasculated role that required nothing more than lungpower.

And I'm afraid Winston Bogarde is Dirk Kuyt to me, a player who got seriously found out once he left the familiar confines of the Ajax set up.

Now of course there are plenty of great players who transfer clubs and don't always make a success of things for a variety of different reasons. Veron at Man United is a good example here, however if you look at the entirety of his career then you see that he was successful at the great majority of his clubs. That's a decent indicator of his talent. Bogarde on the other hand could not have had a worse career post Ajax if he had deliberately tried to fuck it all up - though I do realise that trying is not part of the Bogarde lexicon. He was an embarrassment in every sense and that's how his career will rightly be remembered.

Talking about Frank De Boer's pace misses the point of him. His yards came in his head, seeing stuff before others. His problem was with his physical decline through injury which made him tentative in physical encounters, as a result he was

weak and easy to shrug off the ball.

to a certain extent this is true of all of those players. At ajax they played a system. At ajax they automatically knew beforehand where their teammates were going to be and were a bit like one of those dynamo kiev teams, and because they could hang onto the ball for a long time players like bogarde de boer and reizinger didn't have their weaknesses exposed.

They were also a perfectly balanced team. There is that photograph in a beautiful orange, where you see Kluivert pressed up against the two centre halves, with overmars on one touchline, finidi on the other with Litmanen and davids pouring over the halfway line with the ball and all you can see is all that space between the defenders and their palpable sense of panic. The man with the ball has so many options, and so much space.

Even when Van Gaal tried to recreate the moment, like a catalonian great gatsby, the players themselves were different, and no-longer prepared/able to do everything that made them unbeatable.

De Boer's problem with pace was that barcelona never offered him the protection that Ajax did when the opposition got the ball, and frequently you would see de boer on his own in the vastness of the barcelona half confronted with two or three attackers pouring past him.

I would say it is only true of some of them. The Ajax team wasn't a team of expensive superstars, like Chelsea, Real Madrid or Milan. It was a proper, you know, team. There were some players in that team who were outstanding: Litmanen, Kanu, the de Boers, Davids, Seedorf, Van der Sar. Then there were good players who complimented them: the likes of Kluivert, Bogarde, Reiziger and Blind. The problem is that various chairmen/fans just assumed that the whole team was brilliant. Overmaars did well at Arsenal and only tailed off in the last couple of months when it became aparent he was leaving. Davids had to re-invent his game before he started to become a success.
