Top fact One area of the stadium has red seats, put in when the owners briefly changed Cardiff's shirts from blue to red because they thought red was a lucky colour.



Used by Derby County **Capacity** 33,597 Year opened 1997


Top fact Pride Park has many items from Derby's previous ground, including the old stadium clock in one of the stands.



18 **Riverside Stadium**

Used by Middlesbrough **Capacity** 34,742 Year opened 1995

Top fact It is next to the town's main river, the Tees, which is why it's called the Riverside.



17 ELLAND ROAD

Used by Leeds United **Capacity** 37,890 Year opened 1897

Top fact The ground's floodlights used to be among the tallest anywhere in the country.



Used by Everton **Capacity** 39,572

Year opened 1892

Top fact Everton supporters call Goodison "the old lady", because it has been around for so long.



15 **HILLSBOROUGH**

Used by Sheffield Wednesday Capacity 39,732

Year opened 1899


Top fact Some Euro 96 and 1966 World Cup matches were held here, plus 27 FA Cup semifinals and even a League Cup final replay.



Used by Chelsea **Capacity** 41,631

Year opened 1877

Top fact It was the biggest ground in London until the old Wembley was built in 1923.



Used by Aston Villa **Capacity** 42,785

Year opened 1897

Top fact Before seats were put in, the Holte End at Villa Park held over 20,000 fans.



Used by Sunderland **Capacity** 49,000 Year opened 1997

Top fact Last year Sunderland held a Volunteer Day to replace the stadium's seats which had faded in colour. The club say that 29,836 seats were changed by 3,523 fans.



Used by Rangers **Capacity** 50,817

Year opened 1899

Top fact The huge red brick front of the main stand looks like a castle and there used to be a press box on the roof, which had turrets and battlements.
